1. John Roberts

John Roberts, the former tennis correspondent of *The Independent* for nearly 20 years, has sadly died aged 84.

He was a vice-president of the BTJA.

John was one of the original members of *The Independent*'s sports department and was one of the key figures behind its success following the newspaper's launch in 1986. He was a beautifully fluent writer who wrote with great warmth. He had a great sense of humour and was unfailingly kind.



Born in Stockport in 1941, he joined *The Independent* at its launch in 1986 and remained its tennis correspondent through to his retirement in 2006, with a spell as football correspondent in 1990.

John began his career with the *Stockport Express* and also wrote for national newspapers, including the *Daily Express*, *The Guardian* and the *Daily Mail*, covering football and tennis.



While working as the *Express*'s sports correspondent in Northern Ireland from 1965 to 1968, Roberts got to know George Best and became the ghostwriter for the Manchester United star's weekly column. He later played a part in arranging a civic reception in his honour at Belfast City Hall after United won the European Cup and Best was named European Footballer of the Year in 1968.

He also authored several books, including former Liverpool manager Bill Shankly's autobiography, ghosting Kevin Keegan's first book and penning others on Best (*Sod This, I'm Off to Marbella*), Manchester United's Busby Babes (*The Team That Wouldn't Die*) and Everton (*The Official Centenary History*).



John was known as a great wordsmith. In a piece on Kevin Keegan, he described the former England international, noting that "Keegan wasn't fit to lace George Best's drinks."

A spokesperson for the All England Club said: "He was admired and respected for his knowledge and skills as a journalist, but he was also one of the sport's true gentlemen: an affable and witty companion in and away from the media centre, and always welcoming to new journalists joining the ranks."



Former colleague Nick Harris said he was a fine journalist, but, more than that, he was a lovely, funny, kind and gentle man."

John is survived by his wife Phyllis, children Chris, Leanne and Gerard, and grandchildren Noah, Jack, Mai and Hassie.

David Luddy writes:- "I first met John in Belgrade at the 1987 Davis Cup tie between the former Yugoslavia and Great Britain. He was very kind to a youngster on the tennis circuit. We did share a few drinks and opinions were very forthcoming. And in the following years when covering the U.S. Open in the 90s and the early part of the 21st

century we would always greet each other by saying the word 'opinions' to remind us of 1987.



I remember once when he had a big spread in The Independent in 1997 on five times Wimbledon champion Lottie Dod. It was during the big pre-Wimbledon event at Eastbourne. He was so proud, and rightly so, that he invited me to his room to show me his distinguished work. He had 16 year old Martina Hingis pose as a 'Lookalike Lottie' in a replica 1887 tennis outfit - including a calf-length dress and holding a vintage racquet - to honour Lottie who was 15 when she first won Wimbledon in 1887.

The photoshoot was arranged with the cooperation of the All England Club and sponsors. Hingis was the youngest winner of a major at that time in the 20th century.

He was also known to put lots of books under his computer so he could type out those distinguished words.

As Nick Harris said he was a lovely, funny, kind and gentle man.

I can testify to that.



2. The 72nd BTJA Annual Awards Lunch

Julian Cash and Lloyd Glasspool along with Roger Taylor, were the winners at the BTJA's 72nd Annual Awards Lunch at the All England Club in early December.



Cash and Glasspool won the 'Player of the Year Award, finishing last season as the world No.1 pair. They won 60% of the vote in a ballot of BTJA members.

Jack Draper won 16%, Sonay Kartal, Henry Patten and Fran Jones all captured 8%. Previous winners include Draper, Andy Murray, Emma Raducanu and Virginia Wade.



Last year Cash and Glasspool won 7 titles including **Wimbledon** and reached four other finals.

They were the first all-British team to win **Wimbledon** in 89 years beating Australian Rinky Hijikata and Dutchman David Pel 6-2, 7-6 in the final.

In 1936 Pat Hughes and Raymond Tuckey captured the title.

Cash and Glasspool also won in Brisbane, Qatar, Queen's, Eastbourne, the **Toronto Masters** and Vienna. They reached the finals at the **Miami Masters**, the **Monte Carlo Masters**, Rosmalen and the **Paris Masters**.

Nicholas Dann, agent for Cash and Glasspool, accepted the award on their behalf.



Taylor was the winner of the 'BTJA's Services to British Tennis Award.' accepting the award from our chairman Tumaini Carayol who also delivered the welcome speech.

The left-handed Taylor won two U.S. Open Grand Slam doubles titles in 1971 and 1972 - first with John Newcombe and then with Cliff Drysdale. That's in addition to winning 9 titles in 19 finals during the Open era which began in 1968.

Between 1958 and 1982 Taylor won overall 31 singles crowns.



He reached three Wimbledon semi-finals in 1967, 1970 and 1973. It was in 1973 that Taylor defied the controversial ATP boycott. He played in the Championship and co-wrote with BTJA member Marcus Buckland about the experience in his book *The Man Who Saved Wimbledon*.

The former British No.1 and Davis Cup player (won 29, lost 11) also captained the Davis Cup team between 2000-2004.



At the Lunch funds were raised for the Stargardt's Connected (*Stargardt's disease is an inherited progressive disease that affects the retina*), and Merton Sports and Social Club for Visually Impaired People. £4884 was raised for the charities.



Writers, broadcasters, photographers, staff, players, coaches, agents, administrators and friends were among 166 people who attended the Lunch.



Our huge thanks to the AELTC for hosting the venue, our contributors to the raffle and help from Tumaini Carayol, Stuart Fraser, Karthi Gnanasegaram. Matthew Lambert, Gigi Salmon and April Tod for organising our biggest event of the year.

4. The 2026 Winter Bulletin Award – Neal Skupski

The unofficial winter 2026 bulletin award goes to Neal Skupski.

This follows him winning the Australian Open with new partner 31 year old American Christian Harrison. They beat Australian pair Jason Kubler and Marc Polmans 7-6, 6-4 in Melbourne.

It was only their second tournament together having played in Adelaide, also in January, reaching the semi-finals. They decided to play together in October once Skupski's partner Joe Salisbury decided to take a rest in the early part of this year. Skupski and Harrison once teamed-up for a Futures event in Glasgow in 2013 and lost in round 1.



It's Skupski's 18th doubles title including his fourth Grand Slam. His three other Grand Slams - are the 2023 Wimbledon doubles title with Wesley Koolhof and mixed doubles with American Desirae Krawczyk again at Wimbledon in 2021 and 2022.



Last year - partnering Salisbury, he reached the finals of the French and U.S. Opens. He also reached the U.S. Open final with Koolhof in 2022 and the mixed finals of the 2024 Australian and French Opens.



By winning the Australian Open Skupski is again world ranked 1, displacing British rival Lloyd Glasspool, having captured the top spot in 2022.

He's won almost 6 million American dollars in prize money.



His older brother, Ken Skupski, has played a significant role in his career, acting as his long-term doubles partner and now his coach.



Skupski went to Louisiana State University between 2008-2012. He studied sports administration as well as playing college tennis.

He was a top player for the LSU Tigers becoming the first freshman in school history to

earn All-American honours, twice in doubles (2009 and 2011) and in singles once (2012). He turned professional in 2013.

Then there is Luke Johnson 28 and Marcus Willis 76, - making it seven Brits in the top 100.



There are also three British women in their top 100. Olivia Nicholls is at 26, Maia Lumsden 76, and Emily Appleton 93.

Alicia Barnett is at 118, Madeleine Brooks 123, Harriet Dart is 133, Ella McDonald 157, Sony Kartal 166, Emily Webley-Smith 167, Amelia Rajecki 188 and Freya Christie 199.
